BUILDING LEVEL PRACTICES

All extracurricular activities, events, and programing are developed by school officials and are ultimately approved by the principal at the building level. All such building level practices, both explicitly or implicitly created, cannot be in conflict with established board policy and are subject to revision by the principal. Any concerns regarding building level practices must be submitted in writing to the principal. The principal's written decision on building level practices shall be final.

CLINIC

Newton High School will provide clinic services for students according to the policy approved by the Newton County Board of Education. Each student is requested to complete a medical reference card, which will be placed on file in the school clinic.

No internal medicines will be given to students without parental permission. All prescription drugs must be properly labeled with instructions for use and contained in the original container. Students who must take medication during school hours are encouraged to do so during class change at the clinic. When this is not possible, the student must obtain a medical pass from the clinic nurse.

DELIVERIES

Students will not be released from class to receive deliveries. Students are not permitted to receive deliveries of food from restaurants or visitors while at school. Please do not deliver flowers, balloons, or other items to school. These items will not be delivered to students during the day.

HALLWAYS

A student must have a hall pass from a teacher or signed student agenda in order to move in the hall during class. Running in the hall is not allowed. Students should move quietly throughout the building. Students are not permitted to use the vending machines while classes are in session. Students are not to loiter anywhere in the building during school hours.

HEADPHONES

The use of headphones/ earbuds is not permitted at Newton High School. Students violating Newton High school's headphone policy, will have their headphones confiscated by an administrator. NO EXCEPTIONS OR WARNINGS.

SCHOOL DUES

As part of the full high school experience, junior and seniors have opportunities to participate in class events such as proms, picnics, and special activities. In addition, seniors are also eligible to receive a host of items that commemorate their upcoming graduation from high school.

Junior Dues

Juniors are assessed dues. All information regarding Junior dues will be supplied by the class sponsor and/or Junior Administrator.

Senior Dues

All information regarding senior dues and materials are supplied by the Senior Class Sponsor. Jostens is the Newton High School vendor for all senior graduation packages.

PERMANENT RECORDS

A student or parent may review the permanent record at any time. It is suggested that the student/ parent make an appointment with their counselor to do this. Transcripts of records require a written release and may be obtained from the Records Clerk. All staff members are instructed to maintain confidentiality of student records.

COURSE SYLLABI

At the start of each semester, teachers will distribute a course syllabus to their students. Students are asked to take the syllabus home and review it with their parents. Since the syllabus will include an outline of the course content, grading procedure, tardy policy, expectations for behavior, and other pertinent information, it is important that students and parents carefully read all syllabi.

PROGRESS REPORTS

In order to communicate the progress of students to parents, the following reports are available:

- 1. Weekly Progress Reports The Infinite Campus Parent Portal provides parents with regular access to student progress.
- 2. **Progress Reports** Progress Reports will be generated every 4.5 weeks and can be viewed in Infinite Campus.
- 3. **Report Cards** Report cards will be issued to all students every 9 weeks.

SCHEDULES

Students may not take more than one course in an academic area without the approval of the department chairperson and the Principal or his designee.

In all cases, final approval rests with the principal pending consideration of class sizes, staffing, etc.

SCHEDULE CHANGES

Schedule changes will be made for the following reasons:

- 1. A student is not in the appropriate course level.
- 2. A student does not have the prerequisite for the course.
- 3. A student has already passed the course.
- Administrative discretion based upon individualized circumstances; students may lose the opportunity to gain credit if principal grants a schedule change.

Teacher preference is not a reason for requesting a schedule change. If a student perceives that there is a problem with a teacher, the parent must call the child's counselor to set up a meeting with the teacher in an effort to deal with the problem. The principal or their designee must approve all schedule changes. Requests for changes will not be made past the fifth workday of the semester.

TEXTBOOKS AND SCHOOL ISSUES ELECTRONIC DEVICES

Textbooks and School issued electronic devices are the property of the Newton County School System and the State of Georgia. They are issued to each student and are the student's responsibility. The student has the responsibility to take care of these materials at all times. If a book is lost or damaged beyond the usual wear, the student is required to pay for the book. Lost textbooks and devices will not be replaced until payment has been received. Lost agendas will also have to be replaced by the student.

TRANSPORTATION

Students may ride assigned buses, walk, or obtain other means to travel to and from school. Any student who wishes to ride a different bus to or from school must have a permission note from home that has been approved by an administrator or designee. All students transported to school by parents should be dropped off at either the front or rear student drop off area.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION

- Class Officers: There will be a President, Vice-President, and class representatives of each class. Elections for rising seniors, juniors, and sophomores are held during the spring semester of the preceding year. Satisfactory grades are required. All class officers will be Student Government members.
- 3. Student Government Members: Members must have maintained at least a "C" average the semester prior to their election. Election of Student Government members will be held during second semester. A student may be a candidate for both the Student Council and his/her class simultaneously. A member may be taken off the Student Council for unsatisfactory grades or unsatisfactory participation.
- 4. Student Council Officers: Student Body and Senior officers will make up the governing board of the student council.
- Candidates for any office or representative to the Student Council must have a satisfactory discipline record at NHS. Any questions
 regarding whether a student's record is satisfactory shall be determined by a joint meeting of the Student Council advisors and the
 Principal or his designee.

GRADUATION AND TESTING REQUIREMENTS

All students are expected to complete a common set of requirements to earn a regular diploma.

<u>HOPE</u> Note: Grades from ALL coursework in the academic core attempted in high school will be calculated in the GPA. Final GPA will be calculated by the Georgia Student Finance Commission using a 4.0 scale. Any grade earned in high school courses taken in the middle school will not be included in the HOPE calculation.
